e had an excellent show table at the September meeting in spite of a smaller than average turnout. As Tom McBride commented on the show table, he also gave out plant awards to all of the members who had accumulated points last year by putting plants on the show table, loaning plants for the NCOS and SOS shows and setting up displays at our own show. The plants he provided for the awards were very attractive and there were many pleased members at the end of the evening. (In fact, several of the bonus plants won ribbons at the NCOS Show; this should encourage everyone to bring in plants for the show table and shows!) Tom also gave out money to the members who had scored the most points in each class on the show table last year by winning ribbons. As we knew all along, one didn't have to have a greenhouse to score those points either!

David Smith's wonderful Den. *diffusum* and Barry Woolf's huge Dendrochilum *magnum* from the show table were then used as major focal points in the NCOS Show display last weekend. Valerie Lowe, Gary Smith, Cyrus Swett, David Smith, Barry Woolf, Eric Wiles and I all participated in the set-up of the show on October 5th and we used plants from 20 different growers. After the judging was finished the next day, MOS had covered itself in glory - and ribbons! We received the Orchid Digest Award for best amateur exhibit and the Best Society Exhibit award. In addition, members' plants in the exhibit received awards for Best Miniature, Best Amateur Grown Pleurothallid Alliance, Best Amateur Grown Miniature and Best Amateur Grown Oncidium Alliance and a total of 30 ribbons by my count! This month's edition of MOS News introduces a new column called "Member Spotlight" in which we feature a society member. Our first volunteer is Gary Smith, an Information Architect at T. Rowe Price, who started raising orchids about eight years ago. Most of this article originally appeared in an online employee newsletter, addressing people who might know little about orchids. Gary was gracious enough to answer some hobby-related questions and we are sure you'll find his answers informative, interesting



partial to my species Phalaenopsis (moth orchids) and Paphiopedilums (Asian Slipper Orchids). They're not as flashy as their hybrid cousins, but I find them challenging and very satisfying when I can get them to grow well. (Unfortunately most orchids are endangered in their native habitat, but in a strange paradox some are widely available as seedgrown plants.)

and amusing. Gary says his hobby started as a benign enterprise but ballooned into an unexpected passion when he joined the Maryland Orchid Society in 2001.

1. Are orchids difficult to grow? What is involved?

There are nearly 25,000 species and over 100,000 man-made hybrids, so there is an orchid for every taste. Many are as easy and undemanding as an African Violet and grow well under similar conditions. Many, many others can be very particular. Hybrids tend to be easiest; species more exacting in their needs.

2. Is this an expensive hobby?

It can get expensive-not something I like to admit to myself. (I had another collecting hobby a few years back where I bought horse brasses from eBay. After about six months, I added up how much I had spent and, after recovering from the shock, stopped cold turkey that very day. I've spent far more on my orchid habit, but the cost-to-benefit analysis is much more favorable.) An average orchid costs between \$15 and \$25. A choice orchid could run between \$50 and \$125. (The most I've spent is about \$75-a new record that I set twice on the same day recently.) Then there are the two light stands (~ \$650 each). Pots, media, and supplies are inexpensive by comparison. All my orchids are in a small (6' x 8') dormer room upstairs in my house. Besides the two light stands at either end, I have a PVC "jungle gym" I built in front of the windows that provides for hanging plants and additional shelf space. At night the lights throw a strange glow out onto my front yard, which I'm sure puzzles neighbors and passersby.

3. Is it stressful or relaxing?

For me "stressful" and "relaxing" aren't the right words. It does require a lot of patience. Most orchids grow slowly and only bloom once or twice a year. If they become damaged or diseased it can take years to recover the full beauty of the plant. On the positive side, when it all comes together, the sense of satisfaction can be enormous.

4. Name and describe some of your favorite orchids.

That's difficult, since my tastes seem to change every 18 months or so. I've been getting into more species lately, so I'm

meetings at which we have a show table (really eight tables). There are typically 120 to 170 beautiful flowering orchids at each one. It's remarkable to see what people can grow. To save gas and driving, I bring my plants to work with me on meeting days. It's usually only half a dozen plants, but it makes an eye-catching display in the office.

Each year in March, the society hosts a full-fledged orchid show in Timonium, during which I take a week of vacation to help. I've had some minor success with very small exhibits. Even with over a hundred plants, only a very few are in bloom at the right time and have sufficient quality to be worth showing.

6. What do you enjoy most about raising orchids?

Aside from the satisfaction of raising happy plants, I most enjoy the friendship of society members. We're a hugely varied crowd, but we all share a common interest in orchids. I found it easy to get involved with the society and currently serve as chairperson for the Database and Auction committees. The Database Committee allows me to ply my trade to design and maintain a contact database. The auction, held in the fall, is one of the main fundraisers for the society.

I also like that there is so much to learn about orchids. You can get involved as much or as little as you like. Beyond the beauty of the flowers, there's judging, taxonomy, specialization in certain genera, hybridization, society leadership, and orchid-related events. The more I learn, the more I come to understand how little I know. Few hobbies offer such room for growth.

7. Do you have any funny stories to tell us about orchids?

Recently, I was in Orlando for an American Orchid Society event. I was late to the breakfast that was offered to participants, so I had little choice of tables to sit at when I arrived. I spied one across the room with an empty seat, asked if it was available, and sat down with my breakfast. When I read the name tags of the others already at the table, I realized that I was sitting among pillars of the orchid world. Nearly all were current or past presidents of the AOS. Collectively, they represented many, many decades of service
