orchid expressions

iddle with orchids long enough and you're bound to pick up a few interesting "big" words. Books tend to serve up most of these words, but occasionally we find that a big word enters into common spoken conversation. For me, one of my earliest big words was "resupination" and its slightly bigger cousin "nonresupination". I was always surprised that we use such words to describe an orchid flower as right-side up (lip down) or upside down (lip up). Why not simply use simple words?

Well, the main reason for this is that resupination doesn't mean right-side up, at least not literally. It derives from a Latin word meaning "to bend back". Hmm, that doesn't help much. Let's dig a little deeper. Picture an orchid spike. As a flower bud forms, the lip is oriented on top of the flower next to the *rachis* (main stem of the inflorescence). If nothing else were to happen, the flower would open, and we would consider it to be upside down, because the lip is on the dorsal side of the flower. For most orchids, however, something does happen. As the flower bud matures the *pedicel* (flower stem) twists 180 degrees so that the flower opens with the lip down. (This is easy to see on vandaceous orchids. At the next show table, look closely at a Vanda or Ascocenda and you'll easily see how the pedicel twists.)

Now if it were only this easy. To produce flowers with the lip uppermost, some orchid flowers don't twist at all and others, to overcome a pre-existing evolutionary history of twisting, twist again (360 degrees!). In the case of such orchids, natural selection favored a flower with the lip on top, undoubtedly to take advantage of some special pollination strategy. Other orchids skip the twisting and instead curl past the rachis to produce lip-down flowers. And of course, many orchid inflorescences are pendant, so an orchid that sports lip-down flowers doesn't have to twist or curl at all.

Confused? Let's summarize: A resupinate orchid is one that, regardless of the orientation of the inflorescence, produces a lipdown flower, bending or twisting if necessary to make it happen. A nonresupinate orchid produces a lip-up flower, bending, twisting, and rarely twisting again as required. And finally an orchid that produces both resupinate and nonresupinate flowers is just messing with your mind.

Q. "Any ideas on how to deter ants from taking up residence in orchid pots over the summer months? I placed my plants on a laminate table and had an ant problem on the underside of the table as well as in the pots." Are the ants harmful to the plants? How do I get rid of them so they don't end up inside my home as well?

*After researching this, we came up with material called "Orange-Gard" which is supposed to be deadly to ants in pots. It should not be difficult once you have the follow the directions for use on the container. Also, I have found that the small ant baits that are sold in many places are effective. There are several kinds by different manufacturers, but the ones that I have found easiest to use and hide are small black plastic containers maybe 1¼" to 1½" on a side and maybe ¼" high. Plus, they are quite inexpensive. However they are effective enough that

the EPA will probably ban them. Do not spray to kill or otherwise disturb the ants as they move about, just place the little black "boxes" in their pathway(s) maybe 2-3 feet apart and leave them. In about 2 weeks the ants should be gone. These can be used for big carpenter ants as well as the little ones, it just takes longer and a few more baits.

Also, you could try these little ant baits around the pots while they are outdoors in the summer.

Ants are not generally harmful to orchids except by being there. They will (and, do) carry scale insects from one place to another if there are enough of them (both, ants and scale). All in all, however, ants do not normally harm orchids directly other than being pestfully unsightly.

fficials believe lamps used for an orchid-growing operation might be to blame for the fire that destroyed a south Titusville, FL home.

The \$670,000 riverfront home, owned by Laura Ward, a Titusville community activist, went up in flames Tuesday, Jan. 9. It took an hour for Brevard County and Titusville firefighters to get the fire under control at 5717 Riveredge Drive, and the blaze gutted the back half of the house.

Nobody was injured in the fire, and no other structures were affected.

Firefighters spent Wednesday morning sifting through the remains of the house, trying to salvage antiques, furniture and art.

Investigators were also on scene, determining the cause of the blaze.
