

Important March 2010 Meeting Change Notice

In March, our regularly scheduled third Thursday meeting will be held on Tuesday, 23 March. Please mark your calendars.

f you attended the January general meeting, you heard us announce that MOS is providing a donation to the American Orchid Society. In November, our AOS Representative, Valerie Lowe, received an unusual letter from the AOS. It was a request for financial assistance.

Most of us who are AOS members have read multiple accounts describing the difficult economic situation in which the AOS currently finds itself. They've let paid staff go, drastically cut their budget, and nearly closed the gardens at the Delray Beach headquarters among other things. In 2009, donations were down to their lowest point since the early 1990s and membership

plunged again after finally leveling off in 2008 following several declining years. It's easy to find people that are indifferent to this situation or outright boastful with their I-told-you-sos. I have to admit that on a bad day I too can be critical of a number of aspects of the AOS. Orchids magazine seems to get skinnier every month and the website, while somewhat improved, is still atrocious in places.

Ah, but it's all too easy to dwell on the negative. If the AOS is guilty of over-extending itself during tough economic times, it

Philip Seaton of OSSSU to Speak at February Meeting

hilip Seaton, Project Manager for the Orchid Seed Stores for Sustainable Use (OSSSU), Seed Conservation Department at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, England, will be the speaker at the next MOS meeting.

Professor Seaton is a research biologist and, previous to working at Kew, spent 30+ years teaching at a college. During that time he became an amateur orchid grower and is interested in all things related to orchids. His biology research degree and interest in orchids lead into work on orchid seed storage, hence his present employment as Project Manager for Orchid Seed Stores for Sustainable Use, a Darwin Initiative project aimed at setting up a global network of orchid seed banks.

Phil is a previous editor of the Orchid Review (the world's oldest orchid journal still in print) and has written probably 100 or more

scientific and popular papers. He wrote the practical guide Growing Orchids from Seed with Margaret Ramsay a few years ago, and has just written Growing Windowsill Orchids which is due to be published this month. He is currently writing a book about Hardy Orchids with a number of co-authors.

"Over the last few years I have been very fortunate in being able to travel the world looking at orchids ... so my talk will include bits about Madagascar, South Africa, China, Thailand, Cuba, Costa Rica, Mexico,

Ecuador, Brazil and Colombia ... I'm looking forward to hearing it! Seriously, I do enjoy giving talks and sharing my good fortune with my audience. I'm a lucky lad, and have spoken about orchid conservation around the world," Phil Says.

the judges' choice: jan. 2010

This column features the MOS' Judges' Choice plant for the previous month. In January, Jos Venturina's Coel. gardneri was awarded the honor. Following is Jos' description of how he grows his plant:



This plant keeps blooming on time every year! Fourteen years ago, we went to Arbec Orchids located in Bowie, Md., to shop for orchids. We purchased a couple of plants and one of them is this Coelogyne *gardneri*. The plant was in a 6" plastic pot, with five or six growths and blooming with fragrant white flowers.

This plant is grown alongside other orchids in the greenhouse. It receives water every day in the summer time and every other day in the winter. Fertilizer is applied after the flowers die off in the winter, using a high nitrogen formulation. In October, I switch to a bloom-booster formula. The day temperature it receives during summer is around 80 to 100 degrees F, and 60 to 70 degrees F during winter. The plant receives light in the range of 1,000 to 1,500 foot-candles. During the summer months, the plant spends time outside of the greenhouse in indirect sun.

As far as I can remember, this plant has been reported thrice already, the latest being last year. It was transplanted from a 12" plastic pot to 12" teak basket. I use fir bark as the potting medium.
