The Judges Choice of the Evening was Paph. Prince Edward of York, exhibited by Mark Robbins. (See below for how Mark grows his wonderful paph.) The judges were Mark Robbins, Patti Kelt and Bill Ellis. There was an incredible 151 beautiful plants displayed on our show table this month!

december 2011 judges' choice

aph Prince Edward of York 'Patty' was part of a flask that I purchased for \$20 in 1997. The flask was from Orchid Zone originally and was supposed to be Paph sanderianum 'Deep Pockets' x 'Jacob's Ladder'. However, when the plants began to bloom, it became apparent that the cross was actually Prince Edward of York. While Prince Edward of York is a very nice cross, people who purchased the flasks thinking they were sanderianum were very disappointed. I was fortunate to visit a dealer with a huge number of flasks shortly after he discovered the mixup and did not know what to do with all of the misnamed plants.

I gave some of the seedlings to the MOS auction and society members and ended up keeping only 3 to maturity. Two clones first bloomed in 2002. One was 'Patty'

and the other, 'Tomcat', received an AM from the AOS in 2005.

The plants have been grown entirely under lights. At first they were with other deflasked seedlings that I grew under a 24" fluorescent fixture with the lights on 24 hours a day. This seemed to be good for the initial vegetative growth of paph seedlings and kept all the sensitive plants fresh from flask together. The plants were in 4" compots and were moved to my basement light setup when they got 4-6" across. Paph. Rose Tapestry 'Catherine' actually bloomed in this setup before I moved it.

For the last 10 years Prince Edward of York 'Patty' has been on a bench lit by 400W Metal halide and florescent lighting. The lights are on 12 hours a day all year. Like all my paphs it is in a



medium mixture of 3 parts coconut, 2 parts perlite and 1 part charcoal. I use clear plastic pots to check the mix for dryness and health. Most of the year I water every 5 days and fertilize a couple of times a month, alternating between different types of fertilizer.

Relearning What I Thought I Already Knew

ast week at work I was reading a technical article on deployment diagram notation using unified modeling

language when I happened upon a word that I recognized but admittedly had no idea what it meant. The containing sentence was, "This [long label] is pesky sesquipedalian to use". An odd sentence under any circumstance, but particularly so given the context of the article. Of course most of you will register the same familiarity with the word that I did, given its resemblance to the specific epithet of the orchid *Angraecum sesquipedale*.

I thought that I knew that *sesquipedale* meant "six-petaled". Having seen many examples of those big creamy flowers with six relatively equal

segments, my derivation seemed iron-clad. But it certainly made no sense in that sentence. A quick look up in an on-line dictionary produced the following definitions:

- Given to or characterized by the use of long words.
- Long and ponderous; polysyllabic.

Okay that made a bit of sense. The long label referenced in the sentence was rather ponderous and because of that might be

difficult to use in practice. But how was it that this word should look so much like an orchid species name?

The answer lies hidden in its Latin roots:

semis = a half que = and pedalis = of the foot

In other words, "a foot and a half". So a sesquipedalian word is a very long word, a literal foot and then some. But what was the link to the orchid? Then it hit me. *Angraecum*

sesquipedale is known as Darwin's Orchid because of its very long nectary spur and Charles Darwin's conjecture that a moth with an equally long tongue—then unknown to science—was its pollinator. And how long is that flower? Why it's a foot and a half of course.

Members will receive a 20% discount on plant purchases.



hile surfing AOS website for a topic for this month's AOS Corner, I came across a little known project of the, the Species Identification Task Force (SITF) AOS (in full disclosure, I have to admit it is little known by me probably because I am not a judge). SITF is under the supervision of the Judging Committee of the AOS and its mission is to try to improve and simplify the processing of awards, with the goal of ensuring that awarded species are correctly named. Members of the Task Force are not necessarily taxonomic experts but individuals who use reference material to confirm the identity of submitted awards. When the SITF collective expertise and reference collections are not adequate, members of the task force turn to a network of qualified experts.

The discussion on their website goes on to describe that the "task force replaces the previous cumbersome identification and verification procedure, which often involved shipping plant material to

a taxonomic expert. The SITF, using today's electronic communications capabilities and readily available high quality digital images, hopes to facilitate the process of identifying awarded plants and to get the process done in a timely manner. Most awarded species do not need a taxonomist for identification, if reference material is available. When reference material is not available we use taxonomic experts who are willing to give opinions based on digital photographs. Occasionally awards will require in depth investigation by a taxonomic specialist, and SITF coordinates this when it is required." Their webpage also provides links to a variety of other resources which any orchidist would find interesting to explore. To find out more about the SITF check out their site at http://www.aosforum.org/sitf - you should all enjoy exploring this site.

This SITF page on the AOS website is an example of the vast amount of information on the AOS website.

We are in the middle of an exciting show season and I hope you all will try to support the shows in your areas. Some that are on my radar screen for this year will be the 2012 Philadelphia International Flower Show. AOS will again be putting in an exhibit at this world renowned event. Last year 265,000 attendees visited this show over its 7 days. The theme this year is Hawaii: Islands of Aloha.
