presidents message

hile we are waiting for warmer weather and are anticipating our annual spring show, it is a good time to go over some of our monthly show table rules.

- The display of blooming plants, winning of ribbons and assignment of points is reserved for **members who are current in their paid-up MOS membership**.
- Members must own the displayed plant/s for at least six months.
- All displayed plants must be free of pests and should be groomed of yellowed or dead leaves and spent flower spikes.
- If several plants are exhibited in one class, one show table entry form is used for all of the plants. All plants are to be place at the single entry form (not spread out).

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This Month, Clark Riley Presents 50 Years of Orchid Growing Mistakes

In something like April of 1957, Clark's mother's friend sent him her spent orchid corsage because she knew the six-year-old was intensely interested in nature. Clark enthusiastically dissected it, remembering over half a century later that it was a lavender *Cattleya*. He acquired his first orchid shortly thereafter, a



Cypripedium pubescens from a wildflower nursery. It went into a small clay pot with field dirt and took a short residence in a west window. It perished (mistake #1 - 3), but not before blooming and cementing a love of orchids that would endure and grow from that point forward.

Fifty-seven years later, he successfully grows *Cypripedium pubescens* and a host of other species. His senior plant is a *Paphiopedilum* Maudiae given to him in 1972. He has had a chance to visit growers, commercial and private, around the northern hemisphere and learn from their successes and mistakes. Beginners and veterans alike will find "aha" moments in this talk and discussion.

Clark has been a member of the Maryland Orchid Society since 1988 and serves as webmaster and frequent auctioneer. There will be no plant sales, so save your dollars for the auction!

Dendrobium capituliflorum

Dendrobium capituliflorum is a smallgrowing plant from the *pedilonum* section. It is from Papua New Guinea and the Solomon Islands and grows in a variety of conditions including lowlands and at some altitude. It is tolerant of cool temperatures as well as warm-hot temperatures. Ours is grown in a warm greenhouse and has always done well. It is in fairly bright light and hangs above the cattleyas. It seems to prefer a fast draining media and would probably do well mounted. Ours blooms sporadically throughout the year, however the largest display is always in January-February. While the individual flowers are small and not particularly showy, it makes up for that with the sheer quantity of flowers it can produce. With its compact size and ease of growth and profuse flowering, it is a great little species worthy of a spot in any greenhouse.

Cylburn Needs Plants and Pots

Cylburn Arboretum in Baltimore City is in need of healthy plant donations, especially species, as wells as pots for some of the slightly larger plants in their collection.

"Our greatest need at this time is for terracotta pots 10-15 inches in diameter, full or half pots. Some of our larger Dendrobiums and Cattleyas do better in terracotta versus plastic and are more stabilized by the weight of the terracotta pots. Our stock of pots in the larger sizes is depleted (as is our public budget), so I'm begging everywhere for donations of pots," says MOS member John Carter, who has taken over as manager of the greenhouses after Alice Hisely retired.

Laelia praestans alba Many factors distinguish Laelia praestans from the other Hadrolaelias but one of the most prominent differences is the very tubular lip. The flowers are also on a stronger stem, lifting their heads up. I grow praestans warmer than its cousins pumila and sincorana. This species comes from the sea level South Atlantic forests of Espirito Santo, Brazil. This plant was obtained from Sam Tsui's Orchid Inn in Illinois.

Get there early to be sure you get the plants you want. **Friday, March 6** – Show opens to the public. 10 am – 6 pm **Saturday, March 7** – **S**how open to the public. 10 am – 9 pm **Sunday, March 8** - Show open to the public. 10 am – 6 pm.

There are still events and days where we need more help.

Set up Staging. Tuesday, March 3. We need 2 -3 more people to help set up the staging for the show. More people make for a shorter day. We are generally finished by 3:30 pm.

Clerking Thursday, March 5. We need at least 4-6 more people to fill out the judging teams. This is a unique opportunity for new and experienced growers to get first hand experience working directly with AOS judges.

Tear-down on Sunday. We will need help with taking down exhibits, staging, packing up and many other things.

Daily sign up sheets. There are still many open slots on the daily sign up sheets. If you have not signed up, please consider helping the MOS by offering some of your time to the Show. When you help your admission to the Show is free. It's a great opportunity to get to spend time with fellow orchid growers and get to meet new growers and new orchid friends.

Things we need.

Boxes are very much needed. Boxes of any size can be worked with but mostly boxes that will carry 2-4 plants. Bring them flat or made up, that's up to you. Bring them to the Show on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday or when ever you can get them there. This is very important so we can keep up with the volume of sales.

Newspaper for packing plants. We use a lot of newspaper and it's getting harder and harder to find. So please save your newspaper and bring it to the Show.

The Webinar for this month: February 25, 2015, 8:30 PM EST Harry Gallis, Accredited AOS Judge and Board of Trustees Vice President will present, Demystifying AOS Judging: What are those Judges Looking For? Dr. Harry Gallis has been growing orchids since 1980, and currently has about 380 plants. The largest groups are Cattleyas, Phalaenopsis, and Dendrobiums, the latter being his current passion. His plants have received 41 AOS awards and, says Harry, "I very much enjoy growing plants for shows and awards." He entered the AOS judging program in 1991, and is an Accredited Judge and Past Chair of the Carolinas Judging Center in Greensboro, NC. In 1999, he was asked to take on the position of national training coordinator for AOS judges. He served as Chair of the Judging Committee for two years. Harry knows lots about judging; getting plants awarded, and will help us all understand what the judges want and how we might get one of those awards.

It is jam-packed with great cultural information. I've never seen anything like Prosthecea guttata, with the unusual spines on the backs of the flowers!

Bletilla, by Hideka Kobayashi and Tony Avent, introduces us to this genus and the breeding trends of these interestingly keeled lips.

Great Ideas, by Ed Wright and Bill Tippit, shows us how to increase our growing space by using vinyl guttering.

When placing your plants on the show table, please be mindful of members who have placed their plants before you. If you arrive late, DO NOT MOVE plants to the back of the table that have been placed prior to yours. Please care for all plants as if they were your own.
- Do not water your plant the day of display. If you do, please place the pot in a water collecting saucer before putting on the display table.

For a complete listing of show table rules, classes and awarding of points, please refer to the 2015-2016 on-line roster available to MOS members.

The monthly show table provides MOS members the opportunity to "show off" their plants and exchange growing secrets and tips. After all, the mission of our society is the promotion of orchid culture and the exchange of information. The monthly show table is one way in which we can accomplish this goal.
