For those of us who put our orchids outside for the summer, it is soon time to think about bringing them inside the house or returning them to the greenhouse. It is very important to remember to check for "critters" that need to stay outside. I inspect, inspect, inspect and inspect

each plant, particularly at the base of pseudo-bulbs, sheaths, leaf axis and upper and lower surfaces of leaves. Tap pots on a hard surface to check for ants. Spray with an insecticide/miticide/fungicide now and again before bringing your plants inside.

As you take inventory of your plants and attempt to visualize where you are going to put them when returning them to their winter habitat, remember that our upcoming auction is November 10. Aaron Webb, Joan Roderick and I will be glad to accept your extra or unwanted, disease free, pest free plants.

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October's Speaker Gregory Griffis Senior Horticulturist Longwood Gardens

Greg Griffis first became aware of orchids in 2009, hearing about them through a college friend. Studying at West Chester University, from which he graduated with a degree in Music Education, put him in close proximity to Longwood Gardens. He attended the 2010 Longwood Orchid Show where he purchased his first orchid. One plant quickly became twenty or so, and before long he was hooked. In 2010 he visited Parkside Orchid Nursery for the first time, and by Summer 2011 he was working part time for Tom Purviance and John Salventi. He studied under their tutelage while working for them, and when they sold the nursery in 2012, he was hired by the new owners as the Grower and Manager of Parkside Orchid Nursery. He managed Parkside for one year, before leaving to grow orchids in Hawaii. He worked for Hilo Orchid Farm for more than a year, spending a large amount of time working with Paphiopedilum, as well as intergeneric Oncidiinae and Miltoniopsis. At the beginning of 2015 Greg began working as the orchid grower at Longwood Gardens, where he remains today.

The Wonders of Orchid Roots:

"The life of the plant is in the new roots." The roots of an orchid plant determine its health. We'll talk about the structure and function of the roots, how they interact with the environment, and how to best facilitate good root culture. We'll also talk a great deal about watering, as watering and potting are two of the most important aspects of orchid growing. This talk targets the beginner and intermediate grower alike, and is aimed at fine tuning our understanding of orchid culture on the whole.

September's Show Table "Judges Choice of the Evening"



Bob Travers plant Encyclia Chiapas was the Judges Choice of the Evening at Septembers' MOS meeting.

Encyclia Chiapas was first registered with the RHS in 1964 by W.W.G.Moir as a primary Hybrid between Encyclia adenocaula (pollen parent) and Encyclia cordigera (seed parent). My plant was obtained from a former MOS President Southgate "Bud" Hammond (1982-1983). This plant is a remake of the hybrid made by Bud. Bud Hammond passed in October of 2004, so I most likely received this plant in the late 1990's before I kept a log of my collection.

The parents are both native to Mexico and can range south to Columbia. This suggests a strong requirement for high light levels. My success did not come until I could support the light requirement. My whole orchid collection winters in the basement under lights and summers outside in a shade stand at about 70% shade. The first time I recollect bringing this plant to MOS Show table was the spring of 2014.

Over that winter we had made major modification to the growing area in the basement to improve light availability. This area is now under a triple bank of 6 tube High Bay T8 fluorescent lights that come on at 4pm and off at 8am.

In the summer of 2015 the plant was repotted as spikes appeared from a 10 inch nursery pot to a 14 inch dish planter. This was a suggestion taken from Jeffrey Morris who spoke at the June 2016 MOS meeting on Growing Specimen Plants. Last spring I moved the plant to an 18 inch dish planter which should provide space for several years. This time I applied some of the Semi Hydroponic information we learned at MOS meetings. Instead of making holes in the bottom of the dish I placed them at about one inch off the bottom leaving a small reservoir. Then I place about two inches of expanded clay balls before filling with a coarse bark, perlite and charcoal mix.

After two growing cycles the roots continue to grow down into the media instead of across the top and out of the dish. There is still room for another year's growth. Staking is done once the flower buds formed and the height of the inflorescences were set. The plant summered on the back deck where it would receive afternoon sun while protected by a partial roof. This year the plant produced a beautiful display about 15 spikes with 80 flowers.

Making More Orchids

Whether you are new to orchids or a veteran, it's good to review how we make more orchids. There are three main types of reproduction:

- **1. Seeds.** Orchid seeds are tiny like dust. In the wild, they germinate with very low success. In the laboratory, seeds are surface sterilized to kill off competing fungi and bacteria and sown on a perfect nutrient media. One pod can generate THOUSANDS of seedlings. Plants grown from seeds/seedlings are the only ones eligible for the First Bloom category on the show table.
- **2. Divisions.** This is how most of us increase most of our orchid. Depending on the particular species or clone, plants will often produce multiple new growths or leads. When large enough, the big multi-growth plant can be broken apart and the different divisions potted up separately. Many plants will spontaneously break into multiple separate plants as they get older. A division blooming for the first time since dividing is NOT eligible for the First Bloom category on the show table. Since the individual plants resulting from dividing are genetically identical to the original plant, each division should be labeled with the clonal name and any awards of the parent.
- **3. Meristem**. This is essentially a super-division technique. The teeny-tiny growing tip of a plant is isolated in a lab and grown under sterile conditions as with the seeds. The growing cultured tip can be chopped into hundreds or thousands of pieces and grown on. Each plantlet resulting from this technique is essentially genetically identical, so each plantlet carries the same clonal name and any awards of the parent. Meristem propagations are essentially divisions of an already-bloomed clone and are NOT eligible for the First Bloom category on the show table, even if grown from a little plant to maturity.

Thank you to David and Margaret Smith and Eric Wiles for hosting and leading the MOS members potting clinic on September 27th.





CULTURAL SPOTLIGHT

Questions and Answers, by *Sandra Tillisch Svoboda*Originally printed in **ORCHIDS**, October 2013 Issue

BRINGING PLANTS BACK INDOORS QUESTION:

My plants are summered out-of-doors on a balcony against a wall. Fall is coming and I have to decide what to bring in and when. I thought I'd leave the phalaenopsis, coelogynes, lycastes, bifrenarias, Oncidium Alliance plants, dendrobiums and my miltonias out, especially the phalaenopsis because I understand they need cooler temperatures to induce flowering, but bring in my paphiopedilums and catasetums now. Your comments would relieve my mind. Thank you. — Anonymous.

ANSWER:

Your decision as to when to bring in will depend on the weather forecast and the temperature tolerances of your plants. I have listed below the temperature recommendations for the different genera you are growing. This should help you plan your move inside.

CATASETUM Most of these orchids are native to hot tropical areas and grow during the rainy summer months. During this growing period, day temperatures of 80–100 F (27–38 C) and night temperatures of 60–65 F (16–18 C) are beneficial. After growths mature, temperatures can be reduced to 55 F (13 C) at night, with day temperatures of 70–85 F (21–29 C).

PHALAENOPSIS These should usually be above 60 F (16 C) at night and range between 75–85 F (24–29 C) or more during the day. Although higher temperatures force faster vegetative growth, higher humidity and air movement must accompany higher temperatures, the recommended maximum being 90–95 F (32–35 C). Night temperatures to 55 F (13 C) are desirable for several weeks in the autumn to initiate flower spikes. Fluctuating temperatures can cause bud drop on plants with buds ready to open. This is especially true when the buds are about the size of a pea and is the leading cause of bud drop at that stage.

PAPHIOPEDILUM Paphiopedilums generally enjoy the same temperatures that we do in the home; ideally, 60–65 F (16–18 C) at night and 75–85 F (24–29 C) during the day. Paphiopediums can be grown outside in mild climates and can stand temperatures up to the high 90's F (35–37 C) and down into the 40's F (5–9 C) for short periods. In fact, many of those that produce multiple flowers per spike actually need short periods at cooler temperatures in order to flower.

COELOGYNE This is a diverse group of plants with many different requirements depending on where the species grow. You first need to determine whether the plants you have are cool, Intermediate or warm growing. Those that produce single flowers in succession (Coelogyne Bird in Flight is a good example) are typically warm growers as are those that produce large numbers of green flowers (Coelogyne pandurata for instance). Many of the white flowered species and their hybrids, especially the larger flowered whites like Coelogyne Memoria W. Micholitz are generally cool growing.

LYCASTE In an article in Orchid Digest, Steve Gettel says to grow these orchids warm while actively growing: 60–85 F (16–29 C). This author grows Lycaste Brugensis (longipetala × skinneri) warm (minimum night temperature of 65 F [18 C]), on the advice of Henry Oakeley (personal communication), but all others are in the cool house during autumn and winter, where they receive a minimum night temperature of 48 F (9 C).

BIFRENARIA These are intermediate to warm growing plants and should generally be kept about 60 F (16 C) at night.

ONCIDIUM Temperatures for this group are generally considered intermediate to warm: 55–65 F (13–18 C) at night and 80–85 F (27–29 C) during the day. Temperatures up into the high 90's to 100 F (35–38 C) are tolerated for short periods if humidity and air movement are increased as the temperatures rise; a good general rule in any case. The exceptions to this temperature regime are those plants formerly included in Odontoglossum and their intergeneric hybrids. These plants are usually recognizable by their bright white or red, solid or patterned flowers. These are distinctly cool growing plants and intolerant for all but the briefest periods of high temperatures. For these plants day/night temperatures should be 7075/50-55 F (21–24/10–13 C).

DENDROBIUM This is another very large, widespread cosmopolitan genus and to grow them well you need to determine to which group your particular plants belong. You can find a good summary describing the cultural requirements of the main groups here: http://www.aos.org/orchids/culture-sheets/dendrobium.aspx.

MILTONIA There are two distinctly different genera that are commonly referred to as miltonias. Those with star- or spider-shaped flowers are intermediate to warm growing and should be treated like the other similar plants in the Oncidium Alliance. The other genus, properly called Miltoniopsis, has flowers reminiscent of pansies and gives them their common name pansy orchids. While miltoniopsis certainly will not tolerate the extremes of temperature that a cattleya or vanda might, they by no means require - or like the almost frosty treatment in which most "odonts" delight. Night temperature is not a critical factor in our experience, as we have grown our miltoniopsis with both paphs (55–58 F [13–14 C] nights) and phalaenopsis (65–68 F [18–20 C] nights) with good success. Night temperature should be kept at or below the high range, however, for best growth. Miltoniopsis will tolerate down to 50 F (10 C) at night if kept on the dry side (but not bone dry). Young seedlings will, of course, prefer the warmer range of night temperature while mature plants should be run at 58–62 F (14–17 C) nights. The day temperature seems to be the critical factor for Miltoniopsis and should be kept to an 80–85 F (27–29 C) maximum whenever possible.
