MALE AND FEMALE CATASETUM: 7 QUESTIONS ABOUT DIMORPHISM

During our July 2021 ZOOM meeting and virtual show table, we discussed the dimorphism of Catasetum. I wanted to learn more and with a Google search found this information below. MALE AND FEMALE CATASETUM: 7 QUESTIONS ABOUT DIMORPHISM

In nature, 90% of flowering plants have both functional staminate (male) and pistillate (female) portions in the same blossom. Having both female and male parts is what is called hermaphroditic sex expression—which is normal in the orchid world, too. Only 6 to 7% of all the plants in the world have flowers that are distinctly either male or female, and Catasetum orchids fit in this latter category. MOS In-Person in a time of **COVID**

(as of August 22, 2021)

As MOS returns to more normal face-to-face activities, we need to realize that 'more normal' is a relative term. There will be differences in how we now pursue those activities. As an organization which cares for all members and their health and well being, we want to adopt the most proactive and cautious policies possible consistent with local, state and federal advice. Here's the COVID guidance submitted for approval to our Board of Trustees.

1. Each MOS member has his/her own levels of vulnerability to COVID and tolerance for that risk. We **EXPECT** MOS members to fully respect their colleagues' decisions in terms of COVID protective actions.

2. MOS **WILL FOLLOW**, to the best of our knowledge and ability, the guidance and directives of the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), State of Maryland, and local jurisdictions, and **WILL RESPECT** the guidance provided by the host of any of our in-person activities. *

3. We **ENCOURAGE** members to be fully vaccinated. We will **NOT REQUIRE** anyone to show proof of vaccination, however.

4. We **WILL ARRANGE** seating and other elements of our meetings for more social distancing. Please **RESPECT** members' desire for such distancing.

5. We **ENCOURAGE** unvaccinated members to **participate remotely** in our monthly meetings.

6. We **EXPECT** any member who has recently tested positive for COVID or is suffering COVID symptoms will **forego participating** in-person in MOS activities.

7. Despite our best good-faith efforts, however, **BE AWARE** that, at any MOS activity, there may be unvaccinated and/or infected individuals present. **TAKE PRECAUTIONS**, as you see fit.

8. By attending an MOS function in-person, you **AGREE** that, if you discover that you may have

been contagious (either by testing positive or being a close contact with an infected individual),

you **WILL INFORM** an officer of MOS, so that we can alert any participant who might have been exposed. We need not reveal your identity, if it's necessary to pass along such an alert.

9. We **WILL MAINTAIN** attendance lists for our in-person activities, so that we can contact anyone who may have been exposed to COVID.

* As of today, August 22, 2021, CDC recommends masking of all individuals (regardless of vaccination status) in indoor settings in areas experiencing 'substantial' COVID transmission. Baltimore County is such an area. MOS **WILL EXPECT**, therefore, until conditions improve, that members participating in indoor activities **WILL** wear appropriate masks.

Get your SHOW APPLICATION here: Log on to aos.org and LOOK for About Us Tab. Click the drop-down menu. FIND and select Affiliated Societies. Go To FORMS in the left column. If paying by check, send your check to the PO Box on the application form. Your application must be signed by your judging center chair.

You may pay for your event<u>online</u> through the website store. You can find the payment page for show judging under the Orchid Awards and Judging Drop down menu. AFFILIATED SOCIETY RESPONSIBILITIES From - The Handbook on Judging

3.9 Judging Centers and Affiliated Societies

1) Affiliated Societies in the area served by a judging center must provide financial and administrative support for operation of the center.

2) AOS approval of judging at shows, events, or as outreach (both domestic and international) must be obtained from the society's center.

3) Affiliated Societies may change the center serving them by proposing a transfer to and being approved by the chair of the new center, and notification of the former center. If the new center's chair disapproves, the decision may be appealed to the JC.

4) New societies requesting affiliation with the AOS will indicate the judging center they intend to support and be served by in their application for affiliation.

Summer Vacation Inspires for an Active Autumn Growing Season

It has been a most interesting summer here at the Smithsonian Institution, with many international visitors, new collaborations, recently issued institutional mandates (such as the Challenge to Understand and Sustain a Biodiverse Planet; see <u>https://ssec.</u> <u>si.edu/biodiversity</u>), and the enthusiasm and energy of summer interns, as well as a little time for vacation or work-related travel.

I was fortunate to attend a cutting-edge botanical conference in August in Australia and subsequently venture into the spring wildflower displays just beginning in the west of that vastly different continent. While we are all familiar with the unique Australian fauna, I found the plants to be equally foreign and, for me, new. It reminded me how many things I do not know and have not yet learned despite my age, experience, and wrinkles. It was also a humbling experience being in the company of some of the world's brilliant botanists, all friendly and engaging. But my insecurities about the cavernous gaps in my knowledge made me feel a wee bit ignorant, inadequate, and intimidated. Have you been there? I must say that it was also an honor.

I like to think that such experiences give us personal growth and make us better at our jobs because they add to the experiences we can share. I plan on sharing some of what I learned with all of you. September has arrived and for many of us, students, and professionals alike, it is time to buckle down and resume business as usual, attack some of our new challenges and use some of the things we have learned over the summer. Similarly, with the cooler weather coming, many orchids, stifled by the high summer heat, are making another burst of growth as more temperate, nurturing conditions prevail.

THEY GROW ON YOU Because most of the orchids we cultivate descended from epiphytic species from tropical forests, early autumn temperatures — naturally cooler, especially at night — more greatly mimic those of the natural environment of many orchids. This month presents an opportunity to gain a bit more growth due to the optimal conditions available. Use of a balanced fertilizer (equal parts N-P-K or nitrogen-phosphorus-potassium) in half- or quarter-strength early this month will help your plants achieve mature pseudobulbs. Strong pseudobulbs, canes and other growths are the key to generating strong, sturdy, multifloral inflorescences.

TAPERING OFF Keep careful watch of your plants this month. Even though they are still growing, with the gradual shortening of day lengths, some photoperiod-dependent plants are starting to slow down, and spikes may start to appear on several popular groups, among them catasetums, phalaenopsis, labiata-type cattleyas and standard, hard cane-type dendrobiums. When these signs come into view, plant growth has often suspended, and reduced watering will be necessary. Pick up such plants and check their weight to be sure they are not getting waterlogged at this critical time.

SMOOTH TRANSITIONS This is not to say that you must suddenly change your care regimen. Just as you gradually acclimated plants to summer heat, or new conditions when you moved them outdoors, reducing your watering in autumn should be done gradually over several weeks. If your orchids have spent the summer outside, and you live in a harsh winter area, it is certainly time to prepare the interior growing space. Before plants are brought back in, make sure all surfaces have been cleaned and sterilized,

and that all heaters and circulating fans are functional. It is much better to find out the heater does not work properly now than on a frosty night in mid-October when it may be too late.

HITCHIN'A RIDE Do not bring fauna inside with your flora. September is your last chance to eradicate any pests that may be harboring in among your plants. Even if you do not see any obvious signs of parasites, sometimes a cautionary spraying or insecticidal drench may be in order. Neem oil is often a good choice to spray this time of year because it is mild and will suffocate most living pests as well as render them unable to reproduce. Best to use any oil products, however on a cool or cloudy day to avoid burning foliage.

Nominations for AOS Conservation Awards

Do you know someone or an agency or society who has done something notable in the interest of orchid conservation? You have

the opportunity to nominate them for recognition for their efforts! _

- <u>The Philip E. Keenan Award</u> was established to recognize and reward individuals, groups, or Affiliated Societies, for outstanding work in the field of orchid conservation, restricted to North America.
- <u>The AOS Conservation Recognition Award</u> was similarly established to recognize and reward individuals, groups, or Affiliated Societies, worldwide for outstanding work in the field of orchid conservation.

Two first place awards may be given in each category each year for \$500.00 and two second place awards for \$250.00.

The application period for both of these awards has been extended to 1 December 2021.

Application for these prestigious awards should include a nomination statement, a short biography of the proposed recipient when it concerns an individual's efforts, or a short history of the nominated group, organization, or Affiliated Society. A concise description (no more than two pages) of the project or endeavor and its effectiveness must be submitted along with the nomination. Several photographs of the conservation work should be included, as well as no more than three letters of recommendation from individuals who are familiar with the work.

The Conservation Committee is hopeful that we can feature these projects in regular articles in Orchids as a reward for the recipients' good work and to encourage conservation efforts. Nominations or questions should be sent to <u>Conservation committee@</u><u>aos.org.</u>

As the world's foremost authority on orchids and orchid growing, the AOS has the opportunity to support vital conservation projects in the U.S. and abroad.

In 2019 alone, the AOS supported five (5) conservation projects involving local community-based organizations around the world. Those endeavors included the creation and support of an orchid reserve in Colombia, to supporting students in Peru who are trying to make an orchid reserve coexist with agriculture in their village.

Donations to the AOS may be earmarked specifically for Conservation through the AOS website.
