March's Speaker

Our speaker in March will be Art Chadwick and he will speak on "Large Flowered Cattleya Species".



Art holds a BS in Electrical Engineering from North Carolina State and an MBA from James Madison University. He founded Chadwick & Son Orchids Inc., in 1989 with his father who has been growing orchids since 1943.

"The Classic Cattleya" is widely considered to be the definitive book on large-flowered Cattleya species and was written by Art and his father. Martha Stewart favorably reviewed the book and had both Chadwicks on her TV Show. A 2nd edition is now available.

Art has the distinction of naming Cattleya hybrids after the wives of the last five U.S. Presidents and personally presenting the flowers to most of the honored recipients. He has spoken at two World Orchid Conferences - France 2005, Ecuador 2017 and his popular orchid advice column appears each month in many newspapers around the country.

Chadwicks operates 11 greenhouses in rural Powhatan County, a retail store in Richmond, and boards over 13,000 orchids for local clients. The company was recently featured in *Southern Living magazine, The New York Times, the Washington Post, CBS Sunday Morning,* and *O Magazine.*

What Is All This Business With Names Of Orchid Plants?

Part II

NOMENCLATURE II

Quote by Linnaeus...

"The first step in wisdom is to know the things themselves; this notion consists in having a true idea of the objects; objects are distinguished and known by classifying them methodically and giving them appropriate names. Therefore, classification and name-giving will be the foundation of our science."

In **NOMENCLATURE I**, it was shown that due to the enormous numbers of unique orchid plants there needed to be some kind of orderly system for naming them with consistency and confidence. Before Linnaeus, there had been work done in an attempt to do this. However, it was piecemeal and scattered without any real help.

As originally stated, for our purposes, Linnaeus' system of nomenclature, updated to current times, is used exclusively when referring to orchid plants. However, the original system was developed using animals. Linnaeus lumped all of the animals known to him into a single group that he named a Kingdom. There was an animal kingdom and a plant kingdom, two kingdoms that were to include all living organisms. Each kingdom was subdivided into a group of classes.

Each class consisted of similar animals, such as 4-legged animals, insects, birds. Originally, there were six classes: Quadrupedia, Aves, Amphibia, Pisces, Insecta, Vermes (worms and mollusks). Each class was then subdivided into genera (genus). Ultimately, each genus was subdivided into species.


Initially, there were these four divisions of known living things, from largest kingdom, to the most detailed species used to identify a single, unique animal.

- Kingdom
- Class
- Genus
- Species

A class consisted of animals with many basic similarities, an example of which is 4-legged animals, which he named Quadrupedia.

In this classification scheme, each class was subdivided into smaller, more detailed groups, genera. The animals of a genus were similar to each other, but with distinct differences. Two examples of animal genera might be Ursus, bears and Aves, birds. As is well known, there are several kinds of bears and many kinds of birds, as many as 9,000+ kinds of birds.

The genus, Ursus, consists of several kinds of bears, each with sufficiently different characteristics to identify individual bears, examples are brown bears, polar bears, grizzly bears. This final grouping by Linnaeus that identified specific animals was named species.





How Long Can Orchids Live?

The short — and smart aleck — answer is that they don't die, they're killed. In theory, an orchid can live forever. Our inability to pay unfailing attention to their basic needs is what usually does them in. However, there are some truly old orchids in cultivation at botanic gardens around the world, where they receive consistent good care. The oldest cultivated orchid with a reliable history is a specimen of the Tiger Orchid, <u>Grammatophyllum speciosum</u> in the Singapore Botanic Gardens in Southeast Asia. This ancient monster was planted in 1861 by Gardens' manager, Lawrence Niven. Let's see, that makes the monster 161 years old this 2022! We should all look so good at 161.

2022 MOS ELECTION



Every two years MOS holds elections for the positions of President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary and two Directors. A Nominating Committee has been appointed to recruit nominees to run for election. The members of the Nominating Committee are Brenda Logan (Chair), Eric Wiles and Kathi Jackson. This year's election will take place at our June 16th monthly MOS meeting.

Officer Responsibilities

President. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and of the Board of Trustees, shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Society, and shall appoint Chairs of each standing committee and supervise their function. The President shall sign all written contracts and other written obligations of the Society. No person shall serve more than two (2) successive full terms as President. John Heinbokel is the current President. He is serving his first term.

Vice President. In the absence or disability of the President, the President's duties shall be performed by the Vice President. If the office of President shall become vacant, the Vice President shall perform the duties of the President until a President shall be elected. No person shall serve more than two (2) successive full terms as Vice President. Laura Sobelman is the current VP. She is serving her second term and cannot be nominated for another term as VP.

Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the chief financial officer of the Society and will receive and deposit the Society's funds, prepare and file and tax returns required to be filed by the Society, remit any taxes payable by the Society, and furnish a financial report at each regular Board of Trustees meeting. No person shall serve more than two (2) successive full terms as Treasurer. John Dunning is the current Treasurer. He is serving his second term and cannot be nominated for another term as Treasurer.

Secretary. The Secretary shall take and maintain minutes of the business transacted at regular and special meetings of the Board of Trustees. No person shall serve more than five (5) successive full terms as Secretary. Ellie Martin is the current Secretary. She is serving her second term and does not want to be nominated for a third term.

Directors. The Directors shall counsel the Board of Trustees and the members and Chairs of standing and special committees on the matters pertaining to the Society, the Board of Trustees, and such committees. Diane Elam and Brenda Logan are both serving their first terms as Directors. There is no term limit for Directors.

- The MOS Election Process. The nominating committee shall report nominees (each of whom shall be a voting member of the Society) for each officer position, other than immediate past President, at the April monthly meeting.
- Additional nominations from the membership at large may be made in writing by a petition signed by at least fifteen (15) voting members of the Society and delivered to the President prior to the adjournment of the monthly meeting in May. Nominations for all offices shall be closed at the adjournment of the May monthly meeting
- The names of all nominees for all offices shall be published in the Society newsletter in June. Election of officers by ballot will be held at our June 16th meeting.
- Upon election, the officers shall take office at the conclusion of the June 16th meeting and will hold office for 2years.

The Board of Directors meets twice a year, either in person or by Zoom. During the pandemic we have needed to add a couple of special meetings by Zoom to make decisions based on this term's special circumstances. I have enjoyed my time serving as a Director on the Board. Learning more about the society, becoming involved in the operation, and spending time with this great group of people. I want to thank the current officiers for imparting their wisdom and giving their time and effort to serving our wonderful society.


