Kicking Off a New Year!

I'm looking forward to seeing a bunch of you shortly at our first monthly meeting on September 15. Since we were last together in June we've convened two virtual show tables (Great plants and pics!) and some of us have participated in the orchid exhibition/competition at the MD State Fair. But our first in-person meeting of the new year is fast approaching and there are several reasons to make the effort to attend; first, it's good fellowship to mix and mingle with friends and fellow orchid addicts.



**Second**, we'll be <u>wrapping up the 2021-22 Show Table season</u>. Those of you who participated in those monthly meetings and exhibitions and shows during the year (16 opportunities in all!) will be getting your just rewards in the form of plant prizes. See elsewhere in this Newsletter for a listing of those prizes. Our good friends at the Little Greenhouse have indicated that they will be unable to provide a home for unclaimed plants this year, so, if you can't make it in person to claim yours, please arrange for someone to get them. Cash prizes will also be distributed for folks who won the most points in each of the judging classes. That listing will be published in next month's Newsletter.

Third, we have received a donation of <u>about 100 plants</u> from the collection of David Donovan, a former MOS member. <u>Those will be available for adaption</u> at this meeting. It'll be a challenge, since none of the plants have identity tags, but the price will be right and there may well be some treasures in the mix! We're asking for good faith donations to the MOS (what you think the plant is worth) for each plant taken. Clark will also provide a freshly cleaned pot to accompany each adaption to aid in any necessary repotting. Plants appear to be mostly Dendrobiums and Cattleya alliance.

Fourth, we have delayed our <u>membership renewal campaign</u> while getting our new PayPal system (it allows convenient use of credit cards, as well) up and running. The September meeting is a wonderful opportunity to submit your membership renewal and take advantage of this new system to pay your dues (still a very modest \$30 – less than any of our neighboring societies!). Cash or checks are also welcome. PayPal should also be available for your contributions for the Donovan Collection plants.

**Finally**, on the bad news side of the equation, we will NOT be providing ZOOM coverage for this meeting for a couple reasons. We'll try to double up any September virtual show table pics with our October session. ZOOM should resume then when we have an outside speaker. # MOS In-Person in a time of COVID (as of August 31, 2022)

As MOS continues with more normal face-to-face activities, we need to realize that 'more normal' is a relative term. As an organization which cares for all members and their health and well-being, we want to adopt the most proactive and cautious policies consistent with local, state, and federal advice.

- 1. Each MOS member has his/her own levels of vulnerability to COVID and tolerance for that risk. We **EXPECT** MOS members to fully respect their colleagues' decisions in terms of COVID protective actions.
- 2. MOS WILL FOLLOW, to the best of our knowledge and ability, the guidance and directives of the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), State of Maryland, and local jurisdictions, and WILL RESPECT the guidance provided by the host of any of our in-person activities. \*
- 3. We **ENCOURAGE** members to be fully vaccinated. We will **NOT REQUIRE** anyone to show proof of vaccination, however.
- 4. We **WILL ARRANGE** seating and other elements of our meetings for more social distancing to the best of our ability. Please **RESPECT** members' desire for such distancing.
- 5. We **ENCOURAGE** unvaccinated members to **participate remotely** in our monthly meetings.
- 6. We **EXPECT** any member who has recently tested positive for COVID or is suffering COVID symptoms will **forego participating** in-person in MOS activities.
- 7. Despite our best good-faith efforts, however, **BE AWARE** that, at any MOS activity, there may be unvaccinated and/or infected individuals present. **TAKE PRECAUTIONS**, as you see fit.
- 8. By attending an MOS function in-person, you AGREE that, if you discover that you may have been contagious (either by testing positive or being a close contact with an infected individual), you WILL INFORM an officer of MOS, so that we can alert any participant who might have been exposed. We need not reveal your identity, if it's necessary to pass along such an alert.
- 9. We WILL MAINTAIN attendance lists for our in-person activities, so that we can contact anyone who may have been exposed to COVID.
  - \* As of today, August 31, 2022, CDC considers Baltimore County to be 'Medium' in COVID-19 Community Level, with masking guidance:

Wear a mask if you have symptoms, a positive test, or exposure to someone with COVID-19. Wear a mask on <u>public</u> <u>transportation</u>. You may choose to wear a mask at any time as an additional precaution to protect yourself and others. If you are at <u>high risk for severe illness</u>, consider wearing a mask indoors in public and taking <u>additional precautions</u>.

The Woodbrook Baptist Church which hosts our monthly meetings has the following policy: Masks are not required in the building but may be used by anyone feeling more comfortable wearing one. Masks are recommended for anyone in the lower level when children are present.

Accordingly **MOS DOES NOT REQUIRE** masking at indoor events, but **RECOMMENDS** the use of masks as appropriate to provide protection for vulnerable members and guests. This MOS policy is subject to change should CDC guidance and/or Woodbrook Baptist Church policy change.

# When There's Little or No Sun

Orchids are plants. Sometimes we forget that in our love life with orchids. But, as plants, their needs are the same ancient elements required by almost all plants — Earth, Air, Fire, and Water. Of those four ancient elements — Earth (potting mix), Air (ventilation), Fire (light), and Water (water) — three are relatively easy to control. The toughie can be light. Typically we have to work with what we have, which can be pretty

meager in modern homes. The perennial Show Table winners typically happen to have great windows, sun porches, or even greenhouses. But some use artificial light.

In the sixty plus years I've been growing, the technology of grow lighting has steadily evolved. In the 1950s and '60s, the lights would have been incandescent: tungsten filaments heated until they glowed. They worked, but they generated a lot of heat and electric bills. The late '60s through the early part of this century saw the rise of fluorescent lights, first the T12 (1.5 inch diameter) and later the T5 (5/8 inch diameter) tubes (the T stands for tubular). They used about 1/10 the electricity of tungsten for the same light output and lasted 20 to 50 times as long. Some of us had light rooms using dozens or even hundreds of fluorescent tubes. One downside of the fluorescent tubes is that they contained mercury, which was ionized to generate ultraviolet light, which caused the tube coating to glow. Alas, mercury is a deadly toxin. The last ten or so years have seen the rise of Light Emitting Diodes -LED - fixtures, which convert electricity directly into light. They use about 1/5 the electricity of fluorescent tubes and may have lives of more than 20 years. They produce negligible heat and often cost the same or less than the fluorescent fixtures they replace.

But is the light they produce adequate for growing orchids? The Show Table results suggest it is. The old rule of thumb still applies as it did with tungsten and fluorescent lights. Give the orchids lots of light and they will do well, regardless of the spectrum, or "color" of the light. Because of their low heat output, modern LEDs can be used in parts of the home where the heat of older fixtures would have been a problem.



GREATIdeas Reprint Homemade Racks for Hanging and Mounted Plants

If you grow mounted plants and you have a lot of them, you need a good "vertical bench" on which to hang them. Such racks can be built out of wire mesh and plastic pipe, can consist of just a coil of rabbit cage wire standing on end on a bench or hung by chains from the ceiling, or can be fashioned from one of those discarded wrought iron porch supports that were once so popular on 1950s ranch style homes but now have been relegated to the greenhouse. Vertical benches have the advantage of taking up a small footprint of valuable floor space while providing a home for a large number of mounted plants. Even a little wire mesh tied to the end of a light stand expands the space when you are growing under lights.

Most farm-supply stores and many building centers carry wire mesh that can be used. Chicken wire is probably too lightweight except for the lightest mounts. Mesh with 1-inch (2.5-cm) spacing works well. Plumbing pipe may be purchased in building centers in reasonable lengths. Copy this page with the accompanying photo and take it to the store and tell them, "I want something like this." You will also need plastic ties such as those used by electricians or heavier single-strand wire to tie the wire mesh to the plumbing pipe.

The best rack I have ever seen was built by Annette Bagby (a retired AOS judge) and her architect husband Jim, who live in Milton, Ontario. The rack was built to house her collection of pleurothallids and other smaller mounted plants in their sunroom greenhouse. Note that the support cross bars may also accommodate hanging baskets for such things as vandaceous orchids. This rack is between 5 and 6 feet (1.5-1.8 m) tall. Such racks are easy to move, sturdy and do not rot. Unless you make the rack wide enough to keep from tipping as in the photo, it might be a good idea to anchor it with a couple of light chains to hooks in the ceiling.
