
## President's Message

# Creating Blue Phalaenopsis - a talk by Rob Griesbach

Our May speaker is Rob Griesbach, with 13 MOS speaking engagements since 1990, Dr. Robert Griesbach may hold the record for repeat performances. Rob is also a Maryland Orchid Society member.

Dr. Rob Griesbach earned a Ph.D. in genetics from Michigan State University in 1980. The following year, he joined USDA's Agricultural Research Service (USDA-ARS)



and retired after 40 years. For his first 25 years, Rob conducted a broad-based research program in ornamental plant genetics. For the last 15 years, he served as the Deputy Assistant Administrator for Technology Transfer where he coordinated programs that facilitated the transfer of scientists' research to stakeholders for adoption. He authored 151 scientific papers, as well as presented over 500 scientific seminars and popular talks. Rob is a Past President of the American Orchid Society. He is currently an accredited AOS judge, chair of the AOS Research Committee, and member of the RHS Orchid Hybrid Registration Advisory Group.

It is clear that amateur plant breeders are responsible for creating a majority of orchid cultivars. One reason is that the methods needed for plant breeding are quite simple and straightforward. Hugo Freed was a very astute observer during his career at Arthur Freed Orchids. In his book on orchid breeding, he states that "genes act in mysterious ways, particularly those with which we are not well acquainted." This presentation will acquaint the audience with the "mysterious" ways in which flower color genes act. In addition, the genetic engineering methods used to create true blue Phalaenopsis flowers will be described.

## China: Orchid Conservation vs. Exploitation

Orchid conservation has been a repeated theme in a number of these 'Miscellany' contributions. This month we return to that theme with a focus on China and its conflicting desire to conserve its native flora and to support its traditional medicinal herb practices and trade.

Two themes to watch for in the linked article (https://theconversation.com/chinas-lucrative-orchid-industry-is-a-test-for-the-nations-commitment-to-conservation-184200):

- 1) the perceived differences in the quality of products derived from 'wild' vs 'farmed' plants and
- 2) the sheer size of the orchid trade for medicinal herbs (measured variously in 100's of tons or billions of dollars).

## Clark's Corner

## Orchids — Not Just Pretty Flowers

Our passion is to grow beautiful (ugly/bizarre/fragrant/stinky) orchids. Among our favorites are some challenging orchids. Years of experience will allow us to grow — often quite well — the tricky ones, but part of that experience is looking beyond the flowers to the plants themselves and their culture.

In general, multi-generation plants are easier to grow. The reason is that faster-growing, stronger-growing clones are the ones breeders are more likely to select when they're making crosses. This is one of the reasons it pays to select plants at real orchid nurseries, including from vendors at our orchid shows. Select the strongest seedlings from the varieties offered. Look for stocky growth and vigorous roots.

Some examples in my lifetime: Paphiopedilum *rothschildianum* used to be the ultimate frustration, often taking 20 years from seed to flower. As the good breeders have made selective outcrosses, the time has shrunk to 5–7 years at the same time that the plants are easier to grow. Phragmipedium *besseae* used to be a

real pain. Today with some plants 3 or 4 generations in cultivation, this species is much easier to bloom and grow.

Talk to our vendors. Pick plants bred for culture as well as beauty.
